

CODEC ORGANIZATIONAL PROFILE

1. Introduction:

Community Development Centre (CODEC) is leading development organizations have been working in the coastal area of Bangladesh since 1985 for development and provides solution to social, agriculture and environmental challenges. CODEC is working for creating opportunity for coastal people lives under poverty, empowering the disadvantaged, increasing economic opportunity and sustaining natural resource that every people live in the coastal area of Bangladesh could enjoy the same pride and dignity. CODEC managed more than 150 development projects of education, rights, livelihood development, health and nutrition and climate change in last 33 years. CODEC is now working in about 700 villages of 13 coastal districts of Bangladesh. We are now serving more than 1.5 million target members in coastal area of Bangladesh through more than 3000 staffs.

2. Historical Background

In 1970, a cyclone with a huge tidal bore hit the coastal area of today's Bangladesh and destroyed many fishing boats of coastal fisher-folks. DANIDA, the Danish International Development Agency, undertook a project with BFDC to build and distribute 550 improved motorized fishing boats as part of an effort to encourage artisanal fishing, with the purpose to rehabilitate the poor fisher folk and enhance their income and fishing safety. Despite some good technological achievements, the project benefitted non targeted rich fishermen and not the poor. Based on the learning, subsequently the project "Boat Rental Scheme" (BRS) was designed and implemented through a revolving loan fund and hire purchase system with focus on poor fisher-folks. Twenty three boat rental groups were mobilized for distribution of 23 boats on hire purchase system. Community Development Centre (CODEC) revealed in 1985 for efficient social mobilization of the fisher folk community. From the beginning of its development intervention CODEC started its activities only with the fisherfolk communities but over the period CODEC now extended its working area with other disadvantaged coastal communities along with the fisherfolk communities in the coast.

As an organization committed to development, CODEC takes the pride in being the pioneer in representing the coastal and riverine folk in general and fisher-folk in particular. Their woes and wellbeing are in the centre of CODEC's thinking, sources of its aspirations and basis for existence.

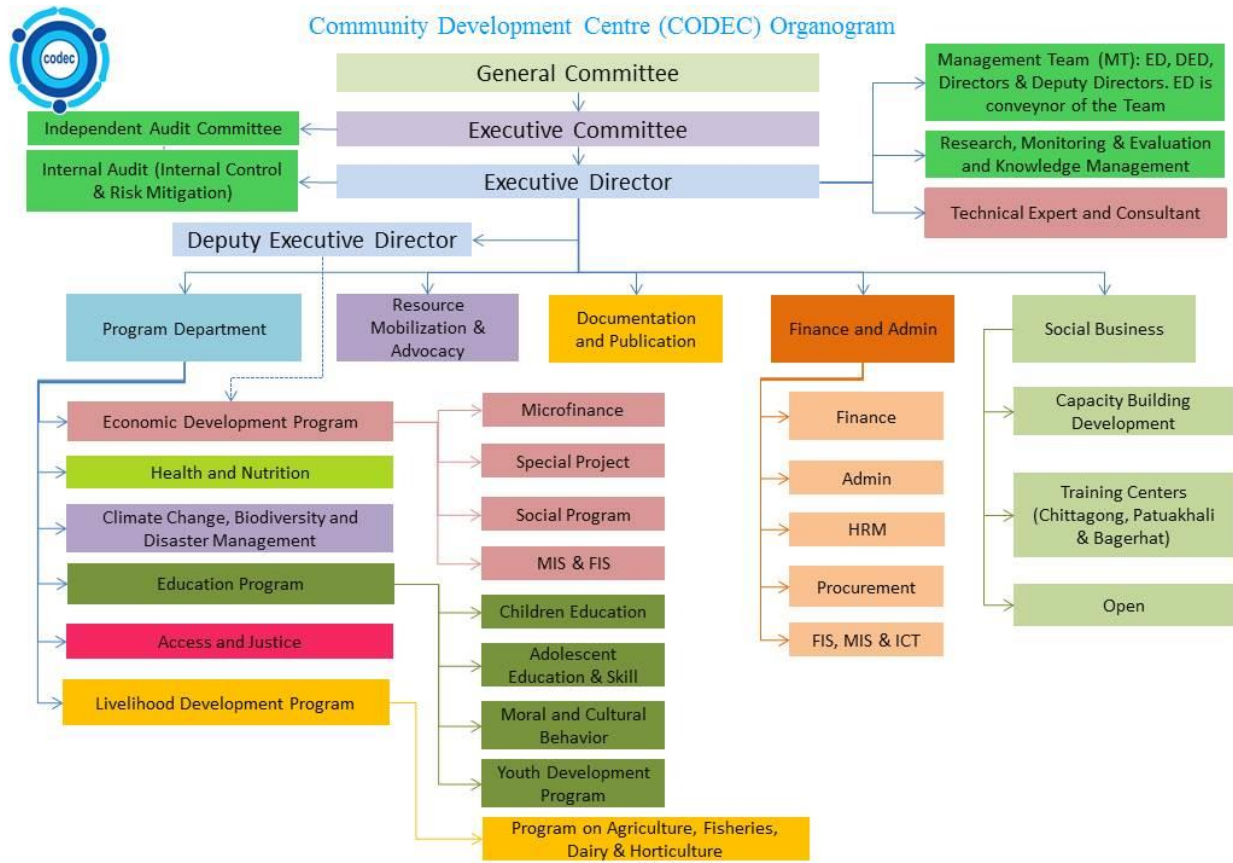

8.1.1 Education, skill and Youth Development

Education program is the core program of CODEC. CODEC always prioritize education program especially child and adult education. Education is the most essential instrument for social change and social development is never possible to make sustainable without education. CODEC started children from the very beginning of the year January 1986. The first initiative was the Early Childhood Development (ECD) called as feeder schools for the children's of *Jaladas* villages of Chittagong. CODEC also worked on formal and non-formal education of children. CODEC also worked in girls education. From the inception, CODEC works for the adult education. CODEC developed many books and material for child and adult education. Along with the education CODEC has prioritized life skill development and building entrepreneur's capacity of individuals. CODEC is the pioneer of Dialogue program with adolescent girls and boys. CODEC developed guideline and supporting documents for the development of life skill of adolescent girls and boys. In last 33 years CODEC implemented many project in the coastal area to increase access of coastal community to health service and improve nutrition condition of coastal people especially women and children.

8.1.3 Conflict Resolution

The violence against women remains a core development issue in the coastal areas, as it is the case at the national level in Bangladesh. Dowry, rape, sexual harassment, child marriage, and cybercrimes characterize the current situation. Violence against women is reported to be rising in general. The rising number of divorce wanted by women is a reflection of non-acceptance of violence attributed to the behavior of the husbands and in-laws, husbands' dominating attitude, superiority complex, extra-marital affairs, cheating, impotency, drug addiction, lack of fellow feeling, conflict of personality, narrow mindedness, and empowerment of the women. The most common reasons women mention for their divorce are: violence against them, lack of commitment, too much arguing, infidelity, marrying too young, unrealistic expectations, lack of equality in the relationship, lack of preparation for marriage and other causes. 9. CODEC Training Centers

CODEC has self-financed and self-operated three residential training centers operating in Chittagong, Patuakhali and Bagerhat. These Training Centers are well equipped with all necessary digital and multimedia amenities.

CODEC Training Centre in Chittagong:

Since 1994 CODEC established its own training centre near the bank of Karnafully River in Chittagong. The center is established on a 6.7 acres plot of land. Construction of the centre was financed by funds from the Danish Radio Calendar Funds. This training centre is far away from all sorts of urban chaos & disturbances and promoted at naturally silent environment; it is fully running without external support. It is now financially self-sustainable and getting attraction to the outside GO and NGOs (local and international). This centre is well equipped and accommodates 60 participants.
